| "one like a son of man" (v.13) | Daniel 7:13-14 <br> Matthew 16:13, 16 | Reflects Jesus' transcendent majesty; alludes to the future mysterious human figure Daniel foresees who brings an end to the succession of pagan, world dominating kingdoms |
| "clothed with a long robe and with a golden sash around his chest " (v.13) | Exodus 28:4, 8; 29:5 <br> Daniel 10:5 | High priestly apparel that signifies purity; the golden sash reflects the wealth, beauty, and exalted status of the one wearing it |
| "hairs of his head were white" (v.14) | Daniel 7:9 | Alludes to the to the Ancient of Days; sug. gests purity and wisdom associated with old age; in 0T, refers to the Father |
| "His eyes were like a flame of fire" (v.14) | Daniel 10:6 | Burning eyes see the secret sins of the heart and burn away sin and impurity |
| "His feet were like burnished bronze" (v.15) | Ezekiel 1:4, 7, 27 <br> Daniel 10:6 | Bronze was used in weapons so suggests association with judgment and war; brightness suggests judgement with intense purity, beauty, and glory |
| "His voice was like the roar of many waters (v.15) | Exodus 19:16, 19 <br> Psalm 29:3 <br> Ezekiel 1:24; 43:2 <br> Daniel 10:6 | Loud authoritative sounds/noises are often associated with God |
| "in his right hand he held seven stars" (v.16) |  | Angels of the seven churches could refer to angelic beings sent to look after the needs of individual churches, or to the leaders or elders of the churches |
| "from his mouth came a sharp two-edged sword" (v.16) | Isaiah 49:2 <br> Hebrews 4:12 | Shows the capability of Christ's Word to bring punishment or reward |
| "His face was like the sun shining in full strength" (v.16) | Ezekiel 1:27 <br> Daniel 10:6 | Emphasizes the brilliance and majesty of His appearance |



## Jesus Knows <br> The Letters to the Seven Churches

1. What and who I really love (Ephesus).

* Has my love for Christ and for others grown cold?
* Do I love the truth about Christ more than I love Christ Himself?

2. What I'm willing to suffer for (Smyrna).

* Am I wiling to accept that suffering is part of the Christian life?
* Do I trust Jesus to be with me and protect me in the midst of my suffering?

3. What I really believe (Pergamum).

* Does my life show that I believe in the truth of God's Word?
* Have any of my beliefs been influenced by the lies of the culture?

4. What I'm wiling to tolerate (Thyatira).

* Do I tolerate sin in my own life or the lives of those in my church?
* Am I willing to confront those who are living in sin?

5. The reality of my spiritual condition (Sardis).

* Am I known for being a righteous woman?
* Does my reputation match the way I live my life?

6. Whose kingdom I am committed to (Philadelphia).

* Am I committed to being faithful to Christ in spite of outside pressures to compromise?
* Am I committed to going through the open doors that Christ has put before me, no matter where they may lead?
